Heritage Society Lecture

1:30 p.m., Sunday: Catholic Chautauqua Summer School: Rejected Relic or Lasting Legacy? with Paul Sukys (Chautauqua Hall)

Paul Sukys will chronicle the development of the Catholic Summer School at Cliff Haven, New York, including its relationship to the original New York Chautauqua and the Chautauqua Literary & Scientific Circle (CLSC) program. Sukys' presentation will explore the origin of the Catholic Summer School of America as a reaction to the New York Chautauqua. The talk will also examine the development of a nationwide series of Catholic Reading Circles, which were seemingly inspired by the work of the original CLSC. By assessing the rivalry that existed between the two institutions, Sukys will question the popular theory that the Catholic Reading Circles were created as a response to the CLSC, suggesting, instead, that the Reading Circles may actually have been independently established.

The lecture will also analyze the revolutionary contributions made by both the CLSC and the Catholic Reading Circles to education at the beginning of the 20th century. The presentation will serve as a prelude to Lakeside CLSC's 2017 graduation celebration.

Sukys is Professor Emeritus of law, literature and the humanities at North Central State College in Mansfield. He earned his doctorate in applied philosophy and art history at the Union Institute and the University of Cincinnati. He received undergraduate and graduate degrees in American and British literature from John Carroll University and a law degree from Cleveland State University. He owns a cottage on Jasmine Avenue and leads the Lakeside CLSC.

Lakeside Chautauqua has been designated as a Tree City USA community for the sixth year. This award is for communities with a variety of trees who are working to maintain and improve their forest. Lakeside has more than 100 varieties of trees, and on this walk, participants will learn about 25 of them. The walks are coordinated by the Lakeside Environmental Stewardship Society (LESS) and led by volunteers Bill Dudrow, Bill Smith, Mary Bishop and Frank O'Dell.

Religious Life Workshop

1:30 p.m., Monday & Tuesday: Questions the Bible Asks of Us with the Rev. Bob Machovec (Fountain Inn Aigler Room)

Where are you? What is your name? What are you looking for? Who do you say that I am? Do you really want to get well? Do you understand what I have done for you? These are just some of the questions posed in the Bible. The Rev. Trevor Hudson (Lakeside Preacher of the Week in 2013) raises these questions and more in his book, *Questions God Asks of Us*. The book will be the focal point of this workshop.

The Rev. Bob Machovec retired in 2016 after 35 years as an East Ohio Conference United Methodist Pastor. He currently works as a Chaplain for Caring Hospice Services in Independence, Ohio. The Rev. Machovec is the former Executive Director of Loudon Volunteer Caregivers in Leesburg, Va. He is a member of the American Association of Professional Chaplains and the American Association of Christian Counselors. The Rev. Machovec earned his bachelor's degree in religion and philosophy from the University of Mount Union and his Master of Divinity in Pastoral Care from Vanderbilt Divinity School. He has been visiting Lakeside for more than 40 years and is assisting with Dockside Worship services on Sundays this summer.

Lake Erie Science

1:30 p.m., Tuesday: Fish with Tory Gabriel (Pavilion West Deck)

Lakeside is partnering with Ohio Sea Grant/OSU Stone Laboratory to present a series of intergenerational programs about Lake Erie and its importance.

Tory Gabriel is an Extension Specialist & Program Manager for the Ohio Sea Grant College Program. In this role, he oversees a team of educators and also serves as Fisheries Educator. His programming focuses on sustainable Lake Erie fisheries, including the charter boat industry, sports fishing and aquatic invasive species prevention.

Chef Stacy Maple is the Executive Chef of Bistro 163. She studied at the prestigious Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts, graduating Phi Beta Kappa, and also studied food styling at the French Culinary Institute in New York City. Maple has had varied entrepreneurial experiences, ranging from a bed & breakfast and a coffeehouse to a slow-food café, as well as her work as a culinary consultant.

Herb Study

9 a.m., Wednesday: Field Trip to Mulberry Creek Herb Farm with Mark Langan; *pre-registration & fee required* (Meet at the Train Station)

Those who previously registered and paid the fee for this field trip will meet at the Train Station to form carpools and travel to Mulberry Creek Herb Farm in Huron. Owner Mark Langan will provide a program focused on gardening in small spaces, including horizontal, climbing and vertical use of space with vegetables and herbs in artistic and practical combinations. A tour of the presenter's small space garden will follow the program.

Langan has been playing in the dirt for more than 40 years. He worked at the local nursery during spring, summer and winter breaks in high school and became the state of Washington's youngest "State Certified Nurseryman" by age 16. At Washington State University, Langan formalized his learning with a bachelor's degree in horticulture. He has also trained with masters in Germany and Italy at several nurseries. Langan has held grower positions at numerous greenhouses around the country, including Green Circle Growers in Oberlin, the nation's fifth largest operation. In 1995, he created Mulberry Creek Herb Farm with his wife and has been collecting unusual perennials all the while. He created "Faery Plant Kingdom" in 2012, which was later re-named "Mulberry Miniatures" in an effort to bring miniature perennials to customers nationwide. His interest in plants spans from cacti to terrariums, herbs to miniature perennials, and native plants to exotic species.

This tour, led by Lakeside Heritage Society volunteers, highlights cottages and buildings in the area from Sycamore to Central Avenues and the lakefront to Fifth Street.

Historic Chautauqua Movement Seminar

3:30 p.m., Wednesday: Historic Chautauqua Movement Seminar with Gretchen Curtis (Fountain Inn Aigler Room)

This seminar reviews the founding of the Chautauqua Movement by Rev. J. H. Vincent and Lewis Miller in the 1870s-1880s in western New York and how the Movement spread throughout the U.S., leading to the development of approximately 300 independent Chautauquas by 1900. The seminar also highlights the early history of Lakeside and its connections with the Vincent family. The rich heritage of Chautauqua Institution (New York) and Lakeside (Ohio) continues in these two largest remaining Chautauqua communities in the United States. Eight other surviving Chautauquas from Maine to Colorado are highlighted.

Gretchen Curtis, a Lakeside summer resident since 2005, recently retired after several years as Director of Operations for the Lakeside Heritage Society. She has visited five other independent Chautauquas in recent years.
