### Heritage Society Lecture

**1:30 p.m., Sunday:** Hidden Lakeside Collections with Evan Engelhart, Former LHS Intern (Chautauqua Hall)

Have you ever wondered what goes on behind the scenes at Heritage Hall or in the Archives? This Sunday program will explore the experiences of former Lakeside Heritage Society Intern, Evan Engelhart, in working with the museum and archives collections. He will highlight some of the most interesting recent additions to the LHS collections and earlier artifacts he officially registered during his time with the Heritage Society.

Evan Engelhart first began his internship with the LHS in the fall of 2016. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in history with a focus in public history from Heidelberg University in 2017. While at the LHS, Engelhart also worked as a docent for the Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Museum & Library in Fremont. He is currently attending Ashland University to earn a bachelor's degree in education with licensure as an intervention specialist.

She has a Master of Science in social administration from Case Western Reserve University and more than 20 years of experience working with people with a variety of mental health issues. She currently is the Site Director of the Ottawa County offices of Firelands Counseling & Recovery Services, which provides both mental health and substance abuse treatment for youth through adults.

### Historic Chautauqua Movement Seminar

This seminar discusses the emergence of the Chautauqua Movement, a 19th and 20th century cultural phenomenon that swept the nation. Originating in western New York in the 1870s, the Movement and its leaders, the Rev. J.H. Vincent and Lewis Miller, soon became household names. The seminar also reviews the important figures who helped Lakeside Chautauqua join the movement and provides information about the remaining organizations on the national Chautauqua Trail.
