## Medical Advances

LOCATION: Chautauqua Hall

**10:30 a.m., Monday: Lung Transplantation** with Marie Budev, DO, MPH  
The history of lung transplantation from its origins to the present day and the future of the field will be reviewed in this lecture. Highlights will include patient stories and an intraoperative picture of the procedure itself.

Marie M. Budev DO, MPH, FCCP, is the Medical Director of the Cleveland Clinic Lung Transplant and Heart-Lung Transplant Program. In addition to her transplant responsibilities, she is actively involved in the internal medicine residency program as an Associate Program Director. Budev holds a Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry from Xavier University, a Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine from the New York Institute of Technology, and a Master of Public Health from Northeastern Ohio University. She is also the current holder of the Macon and Joan Brock Endowed Chair for Lung Transplantation at the Cleveland Clinic. Her treatment interests include all forms of end-stage lung disease including but not limited to lung transplantation, congenital heart lung diseases, interstitial lung disease/usual interstitial pneumonia, COPD and pulmonary hypertension. She has been listed as one of *Cleveland Magazine's* "Best Doctors" multiple times and in 2016 she won the Heart and Vascular Champion Award-Teamwork in Lung Transplantation.



**1:30 p.m., Monday: Organ Donation** with Marie Budev, DO, MPH  
Organ donation is still the "rate limiting" step to advances in lung transplantation, all transplantation, and the main contributor to wait-list mortality. This lecture will explore the myths surrounding organ donation, the impact of the opioid crisis on donation, donation practices around the world, and organ donation in the U.S. today.

**10:30 a.m., Tuesday: Out with the Old: Replacement Parts for the Eye** with Drs. Francis & Marianne Price

The ability to see is often regarded as one of the most precious senses. Far more of the brain's cortex is devoted to visual processing than any of the other senses. The delicate machinery of the eye must be in good working condition for clear vision. Occasionally, certain components may not develop correctly, and parts of the eye often get damaged or wear out over time. Learn about the challenges and the advances being made in transplantation and development of replacement parts to restore vision and consider what is being done to ensure access to proper care worldwide.



Francis W. Price, Jr. MD is the founder and president of Price Vision Group and the Cornea Research Foundation of America. He is an internationally recognized ophthalmic surgeon and recipient of the Life Achievement Honor Award from the American Academy of Ophthalmology and the Barraquer Award from the International Society of Refractive Surgery.

He has authored more than 250 peer-reviewed publications and book chapters and been principal investigator of more than 100 clinical trials of ophthalmic devices, medications and surgical techniques. He is also an inventor and holds several patents for ophthalmic devices. Price is a graduate of Indiana University

Medical School and completed a fellowship in cornea and external disease at Tulane University. He has been active in developing and teaching endothelial keratoplasty techniques to hundreds of surgeons from around the world.

Marianne Price, PhD, joined the Cornea Research Foundation of America in 2002 as Executive Director. She directs the research and education programs of the Foundation, overseeing finances and supervising the daily activities of four professional staff members, visiting international research fellows, and student interns. Price and her spouse, Francis W. Price, Jr., M.D., jointly publish an average of 12-16 articles annually in peer-reviewed clinical research journals and conduct 10 or more research studies annually.

A respected scientist, Dr. Price was previously employed as a project manager and senior project engineer for Union Carbide. She is a sought-after speaker and published author, a member of the American Academy of Ophthalmology, the American Society of Cataract & Refractive Surgery, and Executive Women in Healthcare. She serves on the boards of Retirement Living, Inc. and Marian University. She holds a bachelor's degree in engineering science from the University of Notre Dame, and both an Master of Business Administration in finance and a doctorate in medical and molecular genetics from Indiana University.



**1:30 p.m., Tuesday: Windows to the World: Eye Care for a Lifetime** with Drs. Francis & Marianne Price

Problems with vision are quite common and often develop during specific ages in life. Fortunately, new advances on many fronts are achieving amazing visual results. In this lecture, an overview of the types of vision impairments encountered at different ages, preventative measures, treatment choices available now or in the future, and the expected visual results will be discussed.


## Travels With Neil Zurcher

Whether it is for a day or a weekend, sometimes it is necessary to get away.


Explore Ohio, its adjoining states, and Canada, including a visit to an unusual museum that remembers one of America's greatest airship disasters, the metro parks across the Buckeye State, and some of Ohio's most unusual attractions. Learn about foods like beef-on-weck, a western New York specialty, and "bitter," a drink loved by football fans. Go below the earth in caves and taverns, wander among the prehistoric mounds, and ride down the Ohio River in a sternwheeler. The best thing about all these trips is they all take one tank of gas or less.

Neil Zurcher is a retired professional journalist best known for his segment



"One Tank Trips" which aired on Fox 8 Television in Cleveland. He has received the Distinguished Service Award from the Society of Professional Journalism, a Gold Circle Award from the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, the Award for Excellence in Broadcasting from the Cleveland Association of Broadcasters and an Emmy.

Zurcher has covered world leaders and major events such as the assassination of President John F. Kennedy and also has the unique distinction of being the last Cleveland area journalist to interview Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. before he was assassinated. He has written nine books about travel and Ohio including *Ohio Oddities*, *Strange Tales from Ohio*, and *The Best of One Tank Trips*.



**1:30 p.m., Thursday: *Strange Tales from Ohio*** with Neil Zurcher

*Strange Tales from Ohio* is a collection of stories accumulated over a 54-year career in journalism. Stories include that of an inflatable airplane, a town that has a monument to a pig, a community that has a bronze plaque remembering a moment in history that probably did not occur, the only major battle fought in Ohio during the Civil War at Fort Fizzle, the last public whipping in Ohio and also a chicken that was trained to go to a restaurant each day to get its own lunch.
